IT GOT ME THINKING

Is there a case for culture here? Would it be wrong for me to consider the culture toward women in that day 2000 years ago? A culture in which women were not even second class citizens, let alone leaders. A culture that treated women as just above cattle, and used women for the sole purpose of reproducing male offspring? Anyway, in my reasonings I thought about the head coverings in 2 Cor. 11, I thought about the instructions in 2 Tim. for a woman to be silent in the Church, and if she desired to know anything to ask her husband at home, etc. Then it hit me...

WHAT ABOUT THE SLAVES?

We don't have slaves today, but the Bible sure does speak of them as something that was relevant in the day of Christ. Slaves are a case for culture because the culture has changed in this area. Still, in the Word of God, God addresses it in several places, and not once condemns it. Please don't get me wrong, I am not advocating slavery in any way shape or form, I'm only using it as an example of how a subject that was clearly culturally accepted 2000 years ago, IS NOT CULTURALLY ACCEPTED TODAY! Especially in the US, legal slavery is 100% NOT acceptable! Well, may I submit to you that neither is oppression of any kind, including, but not limited to, the mistreatment of women.
